all, her faith in the justice system has never wavered. "There are a
lot of individual voices that don't get heard," says Wilson, who
earned her law degree from American University in Washington,
D.C. "People just want someone to be fair. I urge jurors
everywhere to be open to the process and to be aware of your
biases. If you can't be fair, be honest."

Wilson latched onto the dream of being an attorney when she was a young girl, and she never saw gender as a hindrance. "I'm a daredevil," she says. "The more you tell me I can't do something, the more I'll want it."
